Stop Motion Animation Project Premiere & After Effects

Stop-motion animation is animation produced by arranging real objects, taking a picture of them, repositioning the objects minutely, then taking another picture of them to create a sequence of consecutive images that create the illusion of motion.

For this project you will create a short stop motion animation as a public service announcement or a short, funny movie. It should be roughly 60 seconds completed. We'll set this up as 12 frames per second, so it will take you 720 still pictures/frames for 60 seconds! Also consider:

- light source (position, intensity, color, movement)
- camera angle, movement and distance from the stage
- opening, ending and transitions (title sequence, end credits, how will imagery transition from one event to the next?)
- timing, pacing (anticipation, exaggeration, think about how the spacing between your imagery effects the speed of the resulting motion)

Criteria

- You must submit a storyboard indicating audio and camera angles. THESE MUST BE APPROVED BEFORE FILMING.
- All projects must be **between 60 and 75 seconds edited**. The first 60 seconds must be the stop motion itself; the final portion (up to 15 seconds) will be your closing credits.
- PLAN!! This project requires a few things to look good. First, you need to film it all in one setting and it's time consuming. Check out either a digital camera or a web camera and take it home on a night when you can spend a couple of hours working on it. Get your "set" done ahead of time and your objects ready before the day you shoot. USE A TRIPOD and use GOOD LIGHTING. You need a very well lit space!
- You will include closing credits to acknowledge voices and resources used. Note where all musical sequences are from (NOTE: There is a classroom set of music available). Sound effects should be used (also, there is a library of these as well!). Check these out before you film and make sure you have ample sound effects (also to get ideas).
- ¥ You will use straight cuts predominantly. You may use transitions between your title sequence and the story and between the story and your credits.
- After Effects use is optional, but if you choose to use it for titling or special effects, be sure to indicate this.
- Finished films will be uploaded to SchoolTube.
